

The Pilot's Walkaround

A preflight checklist for boat showings, from a Navy pilot turned airline pilot. Excitement is the enemy of thoroughness, and a checklist beats a memory every time. Work it top to bottom, challenge and response.

BEFORE YOU DRIVE

☐	Exact model and year vs the listing title	CONFIRMED
☐	This generation vs its predecessor (different boats, different records)	KNOWN
☐	Engine make, model and rating as listed	WRITTEN DOWN
☐	Height and draft figures in the listing	MARKED UNVERIFIED
☐	Your own must-haves, in writing	IN HAND
☐	Questions this listing left unanswered	LISTED

ON THE DOCK

☐	Waterline and boot stripe, bow to stern	WALKED
☐	Hull sides in low light, sighting down the length	SIGHTED
☐	Side decks and handholds, walked like a seaway	WALKED
☐	Canvas, rails, hatches, ground tackle condition	NOTED
☐	What is on top: arch, mast, antennas, what folds	PHOTOGRAPHED

ENGINE ROOM

☐	Engine make and model plates vs the listing	PHOTOGRAPHED
☐	Hour meters, all engines and generator	PHOTOGRAPHED
☐	Belts, hoses, clamps, visible wiring	EYES ON
☐	Bilge: dry, oily, or wet, and where from	NOTED
☐	Fuel tank surfaces and fittings, where reachable	EYES ON
☐	Generator checked where it lives, run if allowed	RUN / NOTED
☐	Access: could you service this at anchor?	JUDGED

INSIDE

☐	Every head flushed, every faucet run	RUN
☐	Berths laid on, not just looked at	TRIED
☐	Headroom and passage at your real height	WALKED
☐	Soft spots: decks, soles, around windows	PRESSED
☐	Smell honestly: fuel, mildew, holding tank	NOTED
☐	Electronics powered up, ages noted	NOTED

THE ASKS

☐	Service records: engines, generator, transmission	REQUESTED
☐	Typical fuel burn per hour, and at what rpm	ASKED
☐	Prior survey, if one exists	REQUESTED
☐	What has been replaced, and when	ASKED
☐	Why the boat is for sale	ASKED
☐	Anything the owner would fix next	ASKED

BEFORE YOU LEAVE THE DOCK

☐	Photos reviewed against your must-haves	REVIEWED
☐	The one thing you'd verify next, named	NAMED
☐	Emotion check: are you buying the sunset or the boat?	HONEST ANSWER

A walkaround is not a survey and does not pretend to be one. It keeps you from paying for a survey on a boat you'd have walked away from at the dock, and it sends you home with photos and notes instead of impressions.
